My beloved mother, Alice Paul Green, slipped the bonds of Earth on June 5th, 2013. She is survived by her much-loved family: son Robert Webb Green, daughter-in-law Lorraine Green, grandsons Robert Alexander and Austin Thomas

Green, all of Lawrenceville, Georgia; her sisters Shirley Paul and Dr. Judith Paul Osha of McLean, Virginia; and brother, James Paul and wife, Sylvia, of Grass Valley, California. She also leaves, with regret, all her wonderful neighborhood friends. Memorial services will be privately held at her home on Sunday, June 9th from 4:30 to 6:00 PM.

After graduating from Washington University, Mom took a nursing job in a 16 bed hospital in the small town of McLeansboro, Illinois, where she met my father, Robert Thomas Green, whom she always termed a handsome, kind, and

intelligent man. They were married 52 years until his death.

Before I was born, Mom fulfilled her Cadet Nursing Corps promise to continue in active nursing by performing public health outpatient care wherever my father's work assignments took them. While working as a staff nurse at Cincinnati's Children's Hospital, Mom was chosen to plan and expedite the in-house operation of the first U.S. Sabin Oral Polio vaccine clinic. Her picture administering one of the first doses of the vaccine was featured in local and national newspapers.

Upon our family's move to Indiana, Mom further pursued her education at Indiana University by earning a Bachelor of Arts degree, with high distinction, but was not able to fulfill her dream of being accepted in the Indiana University School of Medicine - her sole stated disappointment in life. She would go on to complete her education with a Masters of Education from Georgia State in 1983. She then pursued her second career in rehabilitative psychology at the Shepherd Center in Atlanta to help neurologically impaired adults achieve independence and dignity.

Mom loved reading (particularly science and nature) books/magazines and loved classical, semi-classical and opera music. She was passionate about writing newsletters for the various professional, governmental, civic and neighborhood associations she belonged to all over the United States. She often told me her greatest joy was being able to stay at home during my childhood. During the times when my father was gone on business, she would

take me to every library, museum and nature exhibit available wherever we lived. Later, she delighted in continuing these expeditions with her grandsons.

Mom always told me to get educated, see the world, don't be provincial and to leave the world better off than you found it. And as her health declined she often said, "Don't mourn my death, celebrate my life!" I will always treasure the love, values and experience she passed on to me. Godspeed Mom,
until we meet again.
