“Peter was always very kind and respectful to everyone, even as a teenager. He has been a long-time friend of my daughter, Rose, and was one of “the gang”. We were all so proud of Peter for following his dreams through college, studying in Paris, and beginning his career. I remember when I was actually in Boston, attending the American Society for Microbiology, several years ago that Peter was attending college in Boston. He had always invited folks to get in touch with him if they came to the area, and so I did. He and his friend, Chessie, and I went out to dinner one night. We went to a lovely “mom and pop” style Italian restaurant in the “Little Italy” section of Boston. We had a delightful time, laughing and talking – I think we closed the place down. The young people were so intelligent and excited about life – they talked about their studies and their plans, their lives, about Boston and world events. They knew something about everything – this was so refreshing for me. I remember thinking what a very interesting and sophisticated young man Peter had become.

None of us can know why Peter had to endure the cancer or why he had to leave us. His life was too short – and yet he touched everyone he knew. He was gentle and kind, yet brave and courageous at the same time – that’s kind of unique in anyone, especially a young person. As a Christian, I’m reminded that Jesus had some of those characteristics when he was here on earth –He was gentle and kind, yet courageous and decisive, and a good friend. Though we are grieved and can’t understand why Peter had to leave, I have learned a few lessons from Peter and from all of this:

- 1) Follow your dreams and live them – work to make them happen.
- 2) Be kind and respectful of everyone – don’t do or say things that you think you may have to make amends for later. There may not be time for that.
- 3) Love your life and fight for it. It’s worth it. Love your family and friends, and your spouse!
- 4) Realize that every day the Good Lord gives you on this earth is precious, and make it special.

I believe that Peter is in Heaven today. Our sympathy and prayers go out to his family and friends, his mother, Karen, and his dear wife Abby. And to Peter, I would say, "Thank you for being a blessing to everyone you met. May the Good Lord bless you and keep your soul now, as you have blessed others in your life."

“ I only really got to know Peter after he got sick, but I don't think it changed who he was. We used to talk a lot when I took him to his treatments, and during those conversations I learned that the most important thing about Peter wasn't his body, it was his mind. He seemed reserved and soft-spoken, but true intelligence shone through in his speech. The kind of intelligence that nothing could ever hide or dampen. Even as his body grew weaker, his brain never seemed to waver, and to this day I respect him as perhaps the most remarkable mind I have ever met. It is about never letting your mind go to waste, because it is the most important part of you, and it is what made Peter the man he was.
