I can still picture the way he would tip his head slightly back & out came this laugh, a booming up from his stomach, type laugh. You had to laugh with him, it was just that kind of laugh. Many years ago, when both my husband & I were laid off from our jobs & we were in jeopardy of losing our home. I called my Uncle, I knew my Uncle was smart in real estate & all I could hope for was that he could help us figure out something. My husband & I owned some property, but even though we had it on the market to sell, it wasn't happening fast enough. When I called Uncle Warren & asked for his help he did not hesitate. He took name & number of our realtor & called me back afterwards. Uncle Warren told me he instructed the guy on what to do. When I thanked him, he just told me not to worry & to let him know if it doesn't work, that he enjoyed teaching the guy something new.

I spoke with the realtor who told me I had a smart Uncle & that he was going to get busy working on it. Whatever it was Uncle Warren told him to do worked. Land got sold, house payments got caught up & we kept our home. Again, I called & thanked my Uncle. Again he told me it wasn't necessary, even though to us, just saying thanks didn't seem to be enough.

Once Mike & I found jobs we got caught up on everything else & for awhile we even worked two jobs each & made an emergency fund. We were determined that was not going to happen again. Uncle Warren, we have tried, Mike & I to always help people. Sometimes it is just a ride or a bag of groceries, maybe help people move or fix their car. We had been that way before this happened, but after what you did for us, we took it even farther. Now, we know sometimes, some of the people cannot afford to get something fixed, so we go the Uncle Warren mile, & buy the parts & then Mike fixes, whatever it is.

Thank you Uncle Warren, Thank you from the bottom, middle, & top of my heart. Considering the childhood you, my mom, & the rest of your brothers & sisters had, you turned out to be one smart &

absolutely amazing man. Rest in Peace Uncle Warren, you deserve too.

Needless to say she wasn’t very happy with his choice, and it ended up being a complete lemon. It was devastating to me when he started to show the signs of Alzheimer’s, and then have to watch him live with the progression of the disease over the last 18 years, which I think is a medical record. Leave it to my grandfather to be too stubborn to let go, but he finally took his last breath on Thursday morning. He was an amazing man and grandfather and I will miss him every day. “ A truly great man passed away Thursday March 1st. My Father Warren Vincent Young Sr. My Father really was a legend in his own time and because of his hard work and dedication to his industry he will continue to be a legend. Beginning his career with Manheim Auctions at NADE in Bordentown NJ he orchestrated the growth of Manheim after it was purchased by Cox Communications into the largest wholesale auto auction company in the world. From the humble beginnings of just 3 auctions they grew to 26 and then he engineered the purchase of GECARS from General Electric and almost doubled in size to 46. Manheim/Cox Automotive now operates over 145 auctions worldwide. During his 35 years in the industry he won many awards and held many titles. President and CEO - Manheim Auctions, President - National Auto Auction Association, President Emeritus – National Auto Auction Association, President – Eastern Auto Auction Association, Inducted into the Ring of Honor – National Independent Auto Dealers Association and Inducted into the Hall of Fame – National Auto Auction Association. The National Auto Auction Association started the Warren Young Sr Scholastic Foundation which was named to honor him as a pioneer in the Auto Auction Industry. The Foundation has raised more than \$1.5 million and awards a total of \$40,000 in merit scholarships annually for full-time study at an accredited institution. Now with all that said if you ever asked my father what HE did he would say “I clean up, you know, like a janitor.” He came from very humble beginnings and never allowed his head to grow too big. When he was young he quit school when his father passed away and went to work helping his mother raise his brothers and sisters. Later he went to night school to provide a better life for his family. When I entered the business I heard so many stories about him that were incredible and funny. He would travel the country checking on various auctions in disguises. He wore hats and even wigs and gaudy clothes and would talk to everyone then the next day walk into the auction in his dress clothes and the GM would go crazy trying to figure out how he got so much information. He fell through the ceiling in NADE while pulling a prank on someone and I know for a fact he drove a motorcycle

through the small shack that held the trash at NADE because I was there. When the janitor came to him the next day to tell him about the giant hole in the shack he just said "man that must me one big rat." I remember an especially gaudy pair of baby blue shoes that my sister and I just had to steal and bury in the back yard to keep him from wearing them. In all my time in the industry I never heard anyone say a bad word about my dad and in a position where you're working arbitration, all day, every day that's incredible. He always had time to talk to anyone and I do mean anyone. He never cared if the person had 2 cars on his lot or 200 he would happily talk with them as if they were long lost buddies. This I have learned is a talent and just can't be taught and my dad was very talented. His retirement years weren't too good to my father he had Alzheimer's and I would encourage everyone who can to go to alz.org and donate what you can. It's a terrible disease that needs a cure. I love you Dad.
